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ANIMAL HERDSMANSHIP REQUIREMENTS

1. The purpose and guiding principles of Herdsmanship are for exhibitors in the 4-H program to care for their animals, pens, and equipment properly, ensure safety and keep stalls, pens, cages, surrounding areas and animals clean and attractive at all times. Educational displays and public relations are important components of Herdsmanship.
2. It is the primary responsibility of 4-H exhibitors to do Herdsmanship. Non-4-H exhibitors or adults are to assist only prior to 10 a.m. if necessary. Failure of 4-H exhibitor to do Herdsmanship can result in forfeit of all awards and premiums, and removal from further participation in the respective 4-H Animal Division for the duration of the Fair and/ or 4-H State Fair Competition.
3. Herdsmanship must be performed each day of the Fair. An adult must be available in each area during the hours the Fair is open to the public. (See respective animal divisions for additional details about Herdsmanship times, feeding times, etc.)
4. 4-H herdsmen and supervising adults on duty must be identified in an obvious fashion. Exhibitors should be dressed in clean, neat attire and represent 4-H in a positive way. They must also wear appropriate footwear to the animal division. Be friendly and show courtesy to the public.
5. All animal superintendents should notify their respective 4-H exhibitors of specific barn rules and schedules.
6. While on duty, exhibitors will keep floors and aisle ways neat and clean, tack and feed areas neat and clean, and all animals and bedding clean and neat.
7. Wheelbarrows should be emptied regularly and kept out of the aisle ways, tack and storage areas where applicable. Fair management provides manure dumpsters. 4-H members are expected to dump manure IN dumpsters not outside of dumpsters.
8. Exhibitors using the wash areas need to keep them clean and orderly, clear of manure and other debris. The wash racks are for livestock exhibitors. They are not for use by horse exhibitors. Fair management will determine wash area use.
9. Herdsmanship judges will examine the displays at least once a day and will judge anytime during the times outlined in the respective animal divisions.
10. Herdsmanship is judged by clubs for horse, dairy, beef, sheep, swine, and goats.
11. 4-H members will receive one ribbon and respective premium points for the duration of the fair (i.e., they will not receive premiums or ribbons for each day of fair). They **will not** get premium points for each animal.
12. 4-H stall cards or 4-H cage cards will be furnished for each animal and **must** be displayed.



13. Each club must have its 4-H club name clearly displayed in such a manner that the public knows it is a 4-H club exhibit.
14. Greens, flowers, or crepe paper may be used; however, they must be fireproof.
15. Tack areas should be in good condition, clean and neat.
16. Ribbons earned during the current fair only may be displayed and no ribbons from other fairs, shows, or events may be displayed.
17. Awards are given to clubs based upon the following scorecard. Refer to specific animal divisions for additional information if applicable. If specific animal divisions have additional expectations or requirements, it will supersede Herdsmanship outlined in this section of the Premium Book, as long as 4-H exhibitors are aware of these additional requirements.

- Animals – 25%

Cleaned, groomed, watered, feed and bedding appropriate to animal.

- Stalls, Pens, Cages and Grooming Areas – 20%

Clean and orderly; aisles, barn area and tack area clean and organized.

- Educational and Display Effects – 15%

Animal and exhibitor identified, stall cards and club name displayed. Display has educational value that provides information to the public.

- Exhibitors – 25%

Appearance, positive attitude, courtesy, and skill. Herdsman identified as a 4-H'er and available to meet the public and oversee the animals. Proper attire including boots or sturdy shoes when on Herdsmanship duty. Herdsman to keep aisle way, pens, animals, etc. clean while on duty.

- Safety – 15%

Beef and Dairy double tied. All equipment is stored safely and used in a safe manner. Animals should be handled or worked around in a safe manner. Exhibitors are expected to provide a safe environment for the animals and the public.

- TOTAL – 100%

1. For 2024, record books are optional and can be dropped off at the Extension office located at 304 Cowlitz Way, Kelso on **Saturday, July 6th from 10am to 2pm or Monday, July 8th from 9am to 12:30pm.**
2. Record books will not be available to be entered into Castle Rock or Kalama Fairs, please plan for this. This is because of the time it takes to judge record books and the dates of the respective community fairs.
3. Record books will be judged and receive ribbons and premiums. Depending on space they may be displayed at the Cowlitz County Fair in the Still Life Exhibit Area.
4. Record books must be entered in FairEntry by July 1st, 2024.

General Rules—Record Books or a County Demonstration **are NOT required** for participation at the Cowlitz County Fair.

1. Please put the record book either in a flat binder or a 1” notebook. Do not put them in a folder nor a notebook larger than 1”.
2. Record books can be dropped off either individually or by club. If by club—please have them in a box with the club’s name on the box.
3. By this entry time.... all 4-H members should have been working on their record books as part of their project/club program.
4. Record books must be reflective of the member’s own project work for the 4-H year. Those record books that have been done by adults or another 4-H member will be disqualified or receive a ribbon placing lower than the original score.
5. Record books of poor quality may not be judged.
6. **Exhibit tags not required-** however be sure that the front cover of the record book is completed- with name and club at minimum. Physical address can be left blank for safety reasons.
7. Please enter via “FairEntry” for Record Books.
8. Record books are not required for 4-H Cloverbud members.
9. Record books are **not sent to the 4-H state fair.**

4. Animal posters are to be displayed in the respective animal barn as per the animal superintendent's direction.

5. Still Life Posters may or may not be displayed depending on space in the 4-H Still Life Area in the Expo Center.

6. Both animal educational exhibits/posters and still educational exhibits/posters **MUST** be entered in **FairEntry by July 1st to be eligible for judging, ribbons, and premiums.**

PLEASE READ -- Entry Instructions - Failure to follow instructions will disqualify the posters. This must be done before being brought to the Extension office. There are no provisions for completing this at the Extension office due to space limitations.

1. PUT NAME, CLUB NAME, GRADE JUST COMPLETED, COUNTY NAME AND THE YEAR-2024 IN PERMANENT INK ON THE BACK OF POSTER.
2. ALSO PUT DIVISION, CLASS, AND SUB-CLASS ON THE BACK OF POSTER.
3. **NO EXHIBIT TAGS REQUIRED.**

General rules for both Animal Educational Poster and Still Life Educational Posters.
Please Read!



1. Educational exhibits may show any topic of an educational nature as part of a 4-H project. In order to be judged, it cannot be a collection or display.
2. It must teach something to the public and be readable from 10 feet.
3. The display may include sound, motion, etc.
4. No copyrighted illustration or cartoons may be used in educational displays or posters.
- 5. NO GLITTER!!!**
6. Any educational exhibit that is not a current year exhibit will be disqualified at the discretion of the superintendent and/or judge.
7. For animal educational posters/exhibits, 4-H members can enter one poster per animal species.
8. Due to space restrictions, one (1) animal educational poster per animal type and up to two (2) still life posters per exhibitor.
9. Due to space restrictions—posters/mobile/table display/large display may not be displayed in respective exhibit areas.
10. ONE BLUE RIBBON EDUCATIONAL EXHIBIT per exhibitor may be entered for the 4-H State Fair.

BEEF INFORMATION

1. Wash racks must be kept clean. All items left on the wash rack will be picked up and kept by the superintendents until asked for. Wash rack, clipping and exercise times will be posted in the 4-H Beef Barn.
2. Calves must be at least three months of age at the time of showing in order to be shown in a sub-class by themselves.
3. No beef animals will be permitted outside of their assigned stall areas unless during respective exercise and/or show times or by permission of the 4-H Beef Superintendent.
4. Method of watering beef animals will be determined by the 4-H Beef Superintendent to maintain a safe environment for the public during the time that the fair is open.
5. All stalled animals must be double tied. Animals will be led with a control halter or show halter while on the fairgrounds.
6. Stall assignments are final. Any 4-H or FFA member, parent, or leader moving or changing stalls without the permission of the 4-H Beef Superintendent or the respective FFA advisor, may forfeit their opportunity to exhibit.
7. Any 4-H member or parent not following the directions of the 4-H Beef Superintendent may forfeit ribbons, premiums, state fair qualifications, and/or be asked to leave the Cowlitz County Fair. This will be done in consultation with the County 4-H educator and the Fair Manager.
8. Barn rules will be sent to exhibitors after July 1st.
9. **No out of county entries.**

CAT INFORMATION

1. Due to space limitations, exhibitors may only enter one cat. Specific Cat exhibitor information will be sent out **after July 1st in regard to show day, time and place.**
2. A health inspection will take place when animals arrive at the exhibit area/fair. Each cat must show proof of current vaccination against rabies, feline pan leukopenia, and chlamydia. **This is required—no exceptions.** An inoculation certificate must be completed at the administering veterinarian's office.
3. No pregnant or nursing cats may be shown. Kittens must be at least 12 weeks of age and completely vaccinated.
4. The 4-H member is responsible for the care and training of the project animal 60 days prior to the fair and **must care for the cat while on display at the exhibit area and/or fair.** The 4-H members are responsible for handling the cat, including Cloverbuds—not other adults.
5. **Cats must be kept in their show cages, except when being shown. All cats must always be in a harness. Cats must remain in the exhibit area and may not be out on the fairgrounds.**
6. Exhibitors must enter fitting and showing, Herdsmanship, and one type class. Costume class and cage decoration is optional. Cat bowl and cat judging are only available at superintendent discretion
7. Cages can be provided for exhibitors. **If you need a cage provided, contact Jennifer Leach (leachj@cowlitzwa.gov), 4-H Staff after July 1st.** Cages are approximately 30.5 inches long x 19.5 inches wide x 21.25 inches in height. All sides of the cage and top may be decorated but cats must remain in full view. If the 4H member has their own cage with similar dimensions, they may use that cage.
8. Each cage must have a small poster (8 1/2" x 11") introducing the exhibitor and their cat, with a short statement and photo as part of the cage decoration.
9. Cloverbud members, who exhibit in the Cat Division will do so on a non-competitive basis only where the 4-H Cloverbud member is being evaluated and be awarded rainbow-colored ribbons and premium points equivalent to red ribbon per Class and/ or Sub-Class (ex. fitting and showing, herdsmanship).
10. Cloverbud members should demonstrate competence in exhibiting and caring for animal projects prior to exhibiting at fairs, shows, or similar events.

DOG INFORMATION

For 2024—the actual show day(s) and time(s) have not been determined. More information will be communicated to 4-H dog exhibitors after July 1st—the deadline to enter via FairEntry.

1. Health requirements set by Washington State 4-H Dog Program and Cowlitz County 4-H Dog Program will be enforced and followed as directed by the 4-H County Educator and 4-H Dog Superintendent.
2. Dogs must be clean and fully groomed.
3. All dogs must have proof of current vaccinations: **Rabies, distemper combination (including parvovirus and parainfluenza), and Bordetella**. Proof of a current rabies vaccination by a **licensed veterinarian** will be required for the health vet check.
4. All dogs will be given a health check by an animal health professional prior to the opening of the Fair for disease and parasites. Those dogs with disease and/or parasites will be barred from showing. ***The time and day of the health check will be communicated after July 1st by the dog superintendent.***
5. Members must be enrolled in the respective Dog Project and provide care and management by April 1st.
6. Due to space limitations **the out-of-county** exhibitors may be limited and will require additional 4-H volunteer expectations from those out-of-county exhibitors. Contact the 4-H Dog superintendent prior to July 1st if interested. All potential out of county exhibitors must enter into FairEntry prior to July 1st. 4-H enrollment will be verified by county 4-H educator.
7. 4-H Dog members entering the Cowlitz County Fair will be required to meet with the 4-H Dog superintendent to determine skill level, obedience level and socialization level of the dog.
8. 4-H exhibitors will be entered in classes for which they and their dog are most qualified. (See Washington 4-H Dog Program Guidelines for clarification.)
9. Only one entry permitted in each Sub-Class. 4-H members may share a dog as outlined by Washington State 4-H Dog Program Guidelines and with prior approval of the 4-H Dog Superintendent.



10. If the 4-H County Dog Rules are in conflict with State rules (State Fair and Washington State 4-H Dog Program Guidelines) State rules will prevail with the county 4-H educator having final authority.

11. Herdsmanship is required. Failure to do so may result in loss of premium points. The purpose of Herdsmanship is to teach exhibitors how to care for their dogs and equipment to the best of their ability at a show or fair. It is also an excellent opportunity for 4-H members to educate the public on dog care and training.

12. Herdsmanship, grooming, handling, and exercise of the dog must be performed by the 4-H exhibitors. Violations of this rule create loss of learning experience to the exhibitor and unfair competition to other members, particularly in the Fitting and Showing Contest. Pride in your pet and you will be reflected in a well-maintained exhibit and healthy, safe care of your animals.

13. Those not complying with the 4-H dog rules and 4-H Code of Conduct may forfeit all premiums, awards, State Fair qualifications, and may be excused from the fair, with the 4-H county educator having the final authority.

14. Please read 4-H General Rules and Fair General Rules for additional information.

15. Please contact the 4-H Dog Superintendent for the most current 4-H Dog project materials.

16. Cloverbud members, who exhibit in the Dog Division will do so on a non-competitive basis only where the 4-H Cloverbud member is being evaluated and be awarded rainbow-colored ribbons and premium points equivalent to red ribbon per Class and/ or Sub-Class (ex. fitting and showing, herdsmanship, obedience, agility, teams, etc).

17. Cloverbud members should demonstrate competence in exhibiting and caring for animal projects prior to exhibiting at fairs, shows, or similar events.

1. ADGA Dairy Goat Showmanship Score Card (CO544E) will be the guide for Fitting and Showing for Dairy Goats. Other scorecards for Fitting and Showing will following respective breed type.
2. No horned Dairy goats are allowed.
3. *Showing horned animals are as per the Washington State 4-H Policies and Procedures publication found in section 8.7 page 26 that states Market and non-dairy goats maybe shown in market and breeding classes with horn tips covered. If have horn scurs (horn re-growth) longer than one-inch, horn tips must be covered. Horned, market or non-dairy goats may be exhibited in 4-H classes where animals are not exchanged between youth and horn tips are covered.*
4. Read all the 4-H General Rules in the Fair Book.
5. Please be aware of which classes (type of goat) allow wethers.
6. Show order will be the same as animal Sub-Class number listed in the 4-H Exhibitor Book.
7. If space is limited, the number of animal entries may be limited to two per Sub-Class.
8. All exhibitors must do equal amount of Herdsmanship. Pens must be cleaned on a daily basis and/or at the direction of the 4-H superintendent. Failure to do so may result in withholding ribbons and/or premiums and/or State Fair qualification.
9. Each club must decorate their exhibit area that identifies their club and is presentable to the public. Each club and exhibitor is responsible for removing their decorations etc. at the end of the fair.
10. The exhibitor is responsible for bringing their own equipment such as wheelbarrows, pitchforks, broom, etc.
11. Cloverbud members, who exhibit in the Goat Division will do so on a non-competitive basis only where the 4-H Cloverbud member is being evaluated and be awarded rainbow-colored ribbons and points equivalent to red premium points per Class and/ or Sub-Class (ex. fitting and showing, herdsmanship).

The 4-H Rabbit and Cavies Superintendent may incorporate additional limits on entries based on space and for housing rabbits related to bio- security measures, including space/ pen requirements.

RABBIT INFORMATION

1. All rabbits must be entered by July 1st through FairEntry, **no exceptions.**
2. If you are unable to show, advise the superintendent at least 48 hours prior to check-in. Failure to do so may result in loss of right to show next year.
3. All rabbits on exhibit must have a permanent ear number for identification purposes and this number must be recorded on the animal entry in FairEntry.
4. FairEntry must be complete with correct age, sex, breed and variety of rabbit, if purebred. Be sure exhibits are entered in correct Class and Sub-Class. Animals entered improperly may receive white awards only.
5. If space is limited, then there will be a limit of 2 entries per Sub-Class, per breed, per exhibitor. Space availability will be at the discretion of the superintendent. See additional requirements above and additional measures added at related to bio security/diseases for rabbits and cavies. This will be at the discretion of the superintendent.
6. All Rabbits and Cavies must be clean and in show condition. All Rabbits and Cavies will be examined for disease and parasites. Any Rabbit or Cavy showing disease and/or parasites will be barred from entering and sent home, including potential exposure to RHD.
7. Exhibitors are responsible for ice for their own rabbits on hot days.
8. No excessive loitering by exhibitors
9. No doe with litter under four weeks of age, or over 8 weeks of age.
10. No doe over 3 weeks pregnant.
11. Awards will be placed on breeds recognized by the Standards of Perfection of the ARBA, with the exception of crossbreeds and meat classes which will be judged on meat quality only.
12. Judges' decisions will be final.
13. Rabbits will be accepted in the rabbit barn from **3 pm to 7 pm** on the day before the fair opens. Contact Rabbit superintendent for details.

Background Information

1. **FairEntry for all Still Life Exhibits must be entered into FAIR ENTRY by July 14th, NO EXCEPTIONS.**
2. In 4-H, the items, or exhibits are judged against a standard—called the Danish System, with most projects having a “standardized” scorecard. The Danish system is based on blue (excellent); red (average); or white (needs improvement). This means that there can be multiple blues, reds, or whites in the same class and Sub-Class because the 4-H members are not judged against each other.
 - a) Champion rosettes may be awarded to top-quality blue-ribbon exhibits at judge’s discretion within each division and/ or class within each division.
3. All items entered will be judged but may not be displayed due to space limitations.
4. Many of the Still Life exhibits have scorecards or judging criteria that are available as learning tools for the 4-H member. If interested, please contact the Extension office if interested at 360-577-3014, Ext 0.
5. ***Be sure to read each division carefully---as there are certain requirements that if not met—could disqualify an exhibit or be placed at a lower ribbon or not accepted.***
6. ***Some exhibit areas require special instructions related to mounting or display and/or needing a 3x5 card for specific information. The purpose for these special instructions and/or 3x5 cards is to clarify for judging purposes or display purposes. Failure to do so may result in lowering ribbon placing or disqualification or the superintendent not accepting the entry. 3x5 cards are not supplied.***
7. ***All the 4-H Superintendents are volunteers, and WE ARE IN NEED of volunteers/parents/friends to help in the 4-H Still Life exhibit area. We need superintendents in several division areas as noted. If interested in helping contact Pam Toney via email <mailto:pmtoney@msn.com>. If there is no superintendent by July 14th then that division will not be offered.***

5. **Cloverbud members who choose to exhibit will do so on a non-competitive basis. They will receive a rainbow-colored ribbon per Class and/ or Sub-Class and receive premium points equivalent to a red ribbon.**

Special Awards/Recognition:

1. Every division (both animal and still life) may recognize an outstanding exhibit demonstrating the National 4-H Initiative of “Science, Engineering, and Technology” with a special rosette. Selection will be at the discretion of the superintendent and/or respective division judge.
2. There may be special recognition in the Still Life division for a top junior, intermediate, and senior who enters a quality exhibit (receives a blue ribbon) in 5 of the following divisions: P-W.

2. Entries must be firmly mounted on matte board, not poster board. Minimum mat margin is 1" on all sides and maximum mat margin is 2 ½" on all sides. Use dry mount tissue, photo glue, photo stickers, or other suitable substitutes to mount prints. Poster board covering must cover the back of the photo. Framed and non-mounted entries will not be accepted.
3. ***Exhibits must have a small, flat hanger securely attached to extend above the edge of exhibit for hanging purposes. Examples of appropriate hangers include string, ribbon, wire, or plastic hangers securely attached with glue, not tape. Exhibits that do not have secure hangers WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED—as they must be displayed and cannot fall apart or fall off the display area.***
4. Attach the **required** WSU Photography Label (publication number C0890E) https://drive.google.com/file/d/1Est8RbQghj1dkUhVRD45a0cS5x80_AiX/view?usp=sharing

Attach to the bottom of photo matte as instructed on the label. Also put "Cowlitz County" and year on the back of the Exhibit- not on the back of the label or other attachment. Incomplete or missing label may result in loss of no more than one ribbon placing, at judge's option. Fill out the following information on the label:

- A. Name of camera
 - B. Type of Camera (SLR, point/shoot, digital)
 - C. Type of film
 - D. Exposure (F-stop and shutter speed)
 - E. Who prints was made by (exhibitor, friend, or commercially)
 - F. Year in project
5. All entries must be printed on photographic paper. Entries printed on plain paper, cardstock, etc. will not be accepted.
 6. Color enhancements and changes may not be made to the original photo unless it is entered in the digitally enhanced class.

4. All exhibits must be printed on photographic paper; no copy paper exhibits will be accepted.
5. It is recommended that digital captures be taken on "high" resolution.
6. Digital captures must be color corrected.
7. All images can be sandwiched / cut & paste; retouched/ cloned; filters or any other special effects used.
8. A minimum printer output of 300 DPI or PPI should be used.
9. The original image must be part of the mounted display, on the front of the exhibit mat for comparison.
10. A typed index card must be part of the mounted display, on the front of the exhibit mat, explaining what was done to arrive at the final image. 4-H photography label CO890 must be attached as instructed on label and filled out correctly. The original image finished picture and index card should be mounted on a display board (poster board or another suitable mounting surface) no larger than 14" X 22". Do not use a dry mount; it will destroy your print. Use spray adhesive or adhesive mount only.
11. Entries will be scored on the following criteria: Quality of image 20%, Composition 20%, Color Correction 20%, Retouching 10%, Cropping Done Correctly, if Necessary 10%, Mounting 10% and Correct Category and Information Cards 10%.

5. Refer to general photography rules for information on matting and framing.

Special note: Food preservation exhibits are to be turned in on Sunday, July 21st from 10am to 6pm in the 4-H Still Life Exhibit area (follow the 4-H signs).

1. Processing methods and times must follow current Washington State University and USDA recommendations. WSU publications are available on-line. Jams and jellies need not be USDA recipes. All water bath canning and all pressure canning must follow USDA recommendations. Recipes and processing times listed by the National Center for Home Food Preservation are approved by USDA. This information is available at their website <http://www.uga.edu/nchfp/>.
2. Due to potential presence of e-coli and salmonella bacteria in raw meat is **not allowed**.
3. All canned products must be exhibited in standard canning jars, sealed with flat metal lids, and screw bands rings. Rings should be included with the exhibit but must be able to be removed by the judge. The minimum jar size on all canned products shall be 8-ounces (one-half pint).
4. All canned food exhibits must be labeled using round C0803 labels available at the WSU Extension office or available via WSU publications. The label must be placed on top of the flat metal lid of the jar. The processing method will be either boiling water bath or pressure canned; packing method will be raw pack or hot pack.
5. Products canned at higher altitudes will need additional processing time as described in food preservation publications. Fair judges will accept longer processing times if the words "adjusted for high altitude" appear in parenthesis after the time processed.
6. On labels for canned tomato products, indicate if citric acid or lemon juice has been added.
7. For pressure canned foods, indicate if using weighted gauge at 10 lbs. pressure or dial gauge at 11 lbs. pressure.
8. Dried foods must be exhibited in glass jars for display purposes. Label C0804 must be attached to the lid of the container.
9. No two entries may be the same product, but up to five different may be entered in the same Sub-Class.
10. No paraffin seals on jam and jellies will be accepted.
11. Recipes must be included with all dried meats and all canned pickles, relishes, chutneys, salsa and sauces (except applesauce). Include exhibitor name on all recipe cards and state canning reference publication or book used.
12. Food preservation exhibits must have **been processed within the current 4-H year**. They must display current labels (C0803 Canned Food or C0804 Dried Food) and exhibit name. Failure to display current labels will be cause for disqualification.
13. Labels are available in the Extension office from 9 am to 12:30 pm Monday-Thursday or can be mailed to the exhibitor one week prior to the fair.
14. **Cloverbud not eligible.**

Perishable Food exhibits are due Sunday, July 21st from 10am – 6pm

1. Food exhibits should be presented on a **small disposable (paper) plate and covered with clear plastic wrap.**
2. **Recipes must be written on 3x5 cards** for all classes in this division. Must include the directions for making and the baking time and will need to include what has been learned. This is a requirement for all food entries in both the food exhibits. **Entries without recipes will be DISQUALIFIED.**
3. If made from a package mix, list ingredients added and baking time.
4. Foods that require refrigeration cannot be entered (i.e., cream pies, cheesecake, etc.).
5. Two or more members from the same family or club cannot enter exhibits made from the same batch. Each entry must be made by the exhibitor alone. Entries suspected of coming from the same batch will be disqualified.
6. Alcoholic, marijuana and CBD products are not to be used in any food product exhibit.



CLASS 1: FOOD PRODUCT - COOKED

1. Exhibitor may enter a maximum of six different products in this class. No two entries may be the same product, but up to three different foods may be entered in the same sub-class.
2. Include 1/4 of a cake, 1/4 of a loaf of bread, or 1/4 of a pie per entry. Include four cookies, rolls, or buns per entry. Do not enter cream filled or chiffon pies, cream based or uncooked products. Exception: cream cheese frostings and glazes that are high in sugar content will be accepted for entry.
3. Entries may be made from a prepared mix or separate ingredients.
4. **Recipes** are to be **included** for all exhibits in this class. Include exhibitor name on all recipe cards.

4. Preserved Food Quick Meal – Cloverbud not eligible. Include a menu for a meal, accompanied by 3-5 jars of home canned/dried food and/or home dried foods to be used in the meal; include a 3" x 5" card with nutritional information, and food preparation methods



appropriate to the preserved items. Must follow USDA requirements as per Division U - Food Preservation.

CLASS 3: DECORATED FOOD PRODUCT

May be a decorated Styrofoam, plastic, or cardboard form or the actual baked item. Will only be evaluated on the artistic work. Only one item may be entered in each Sub-Class of this class.

2. A 3x5 card must be attached to all fabric items and garments with the following information:

- **Age of the exhibitor**
- **Number of years in the project**
- **Care instructions if a separate label is not permanently attached to the exhibit. If sleepwear, needs to note that it's flame-retardant fabric.**
- **This information is available when fabric is purchased and can be obtained from the end of fabric bolt.**

3. Superintendent and/or judge can change Class or Sub-Class for each exhibit, if entered wrong.

4. More than one article may be entered in each Sub-Class within clothing, but the articles must be of a different type and pattern (not two skirts or sleeveless blouses from the same type of fabric and/or pattern).

5. All children's sleepwear, infant through youth size 14, must be made of flame-retardant fabric and noted on the 3X 5 care as mentioned above.

6. Sleepwear, sized 9 months to youth size 14 may be all cotton or cotton blend garments if they are form fitting. Youth gowns and robes (loose) must be made from flame retardant fabric



to be labeled “sleepwear”. Garments made from fabric not considered flame retardant must be labeled and entered as “loungewear”. Infant sleepwear sized under 9 months are except, as are adult sized garments.

7. Exhibits will lose as much as one placing if the article is soiled, not pressed or 3X5 card is missing or incomplete as per judge’s decision. Exhibit may also be disqualified.

8. Champion and reserve champion rosettes for outstanding workmanship are at judge’s discretion.

9. The Summer 4-H Sewing Day Camp participants who are not enrolled in a regular 4-H club will still enter the same class and Sub-Class in this division, Clothing & Textile Arts and will be eligible for ribbons, premiums, and champion rosettes.

If they are enrolled as a regular 4-H club member, they are eligible for 4-H State Fair if they meet state fair eligibility requirements. Cloverbuds are NOT eligible for the 4-H State Fair.

CLASS 1: STILL LIFE DEMONSTRATIONS

Blue 40, Red 30, White 20, Rainbow 30

1. Must enter by July 1st in FairEntry.
2. 4-H members wishing to give a still life 4-H must be aware that the primary available times to do demonstrations will be **Thursday or Friday of the Fair between 6:00 pm to 8:30 pm in the 4-H Still Life exhibit area. Or by special arrangements-if these times don't work.**
3. This is an opportunity for 4-H members to demonstrate their communication skills in expressing their thoughts clearly and effectively. Members can do either a demonstration (tell others how to do something while doing it) or an illustrated talk (using visual aids to show how to do something).
4. Presentations are up to 15 minutes long and scheduled at 20-minute intervals. 5. Junior, Intermediate and Senior members who receive a blue ribbon at County Fair contest are eligible to go to State Fair in Demonstrations.

CLASS 2: 4-H IN ACTION

1. **Must enter by July 1st in FairEntry.**
2. 4-H in Action can be done either in the 4-H Still Life Exhibit area or the respective animal barns.
3. For 4-H In Action in the Still Life area the 4-H member must be accompanied by a parent or leader and will only be offered **Thursday and Friday in the 4-H Still Life Exhibit Area, times to be determined.**
4. For 4-H In Action in the respective animal barns, the 4-H member must make arrangements with the respective animal superintendent.
5. ONE HOUR MINIMUM, except Cloverbuds which will be ½ hour only. Cloverbuds can only do 4-H in Action in those animal project areas that allow Cloverbuds if using an animal.
6. **4-H In Action is a non-judged activity.** But Juniors, Intermediates and Seniors are eligible to participate in the State Fair.
7. This activity is not as formal as a demonstration; however, the presentation should be planned and practiced. The presentation should reflect 4-H project work. Individuals, teams, or groups are encouraged to share an activity with the public. Information should be presented, and questions answered.
8. No additional points are earned for longer times or multiple participation events, regardless of subject matter.
9. The 4-H member is responsible for providing all supplies and equipment necessary to complete their presentation.
10. Exhibits from the video photography project may be entered in this Division.
11. Food products will not be distributed to the public.
12. Animals used for 4-H IN ACTION must already be entered as a 4-H project and must do 4-H In Action in their respective animal exhibit area. Arrangements will be made with the respective animal superintendent.
13. Examples of activities that work well for 4-H In Action: spinning wool, using a serger to construct a garment, showing how to use grooming equipment, how and why to recycle, construction of craft items, quilting or knitting or crocheting or sewing, showing how cameras work, showing how to build something, demonstrating how to create a bonsai.
